| | Ramadan is the 9th month in the Islamic calendar when most Muslims fast from dawn to sunset, taking neither food nor water. Ramadan is a special and sacred time for the entire community. | Eid ul-Fitr, the Festival of Breaking-the-Fast, marks the end of Ramadan with prayer, celebrations and festive meals with family and community. | The Feast of the Sacrifice, following in Prophet Abraham's footsteps, honors unwavering faith in God and devotion to community. This is also the season of Hajj, the pilgrimage to Mecca. |

^{*}The **Muslim Calendar** is a **lunar calendar**, following the phases of the moon, with each month beginning at the new moon. The Lunar Calendar is approximately 10 - 11 days shorter than the solar (Gregorian) calendar. The dates of each holiday or observance are approximate, as they begin with the sighting of the moon.

^{**}Days begin at sunset, thus all holidays begin the evening before the date given.
